Symbols in the Book of Revelation

Revelation is written in the apocalyptic genre of literature, containing many signs and symbols. The word translated "made known" or "communicated" in Rev 1:1 is literally "signified," to communicate that Revelation is written in the language of signs and symbols. We should be careful not to interpret a symbol in a widely different way to the way other scriptures use it. John is building upon known historic Old Testament symbols and types. We should always look for the main sense of the symbol, not every part has to be significant.
