Date: 9/14/25 **Text:** Isa 1:1-31

- 1. In Isaiah 1:2–4, God accuses His people of **rebellion**. What images does Isaiah use to describe their rebellion, and what do those images teach us about sin?
- 2. How does Isaiah describe the spiritual and moral sickness of the people in verses 5–9? How might these verses connect with the idea of shalom being broken?
- 3. In verses 10–15, why does God reject Israel's sacrifices and worship practices? What does this reveal about God's priorities in worship? How can we do this today?
- 4. What does God *actually* desire from His people according to verses 16–17? How would you summarize His call in your own words?
- 5. Verse 18 promises forgiveness ("though your sins are like scarlet..."). How does this verse balance the strong words of judgment in the rest of the chapter?
- 6. In verses 21–23, Jerusalem is compared to a corrupt city. What signs of injustice are listed here, and how do they compare with injustices we see today?
- 7. Verse 27 says, "Zion shall be redeemed by justice." How do you understand the connection between justice and redemption?
- 8. Where do you see examples of "empty religion" in today's world or in your own life? How can we guard against it?
- 9. What role does **pain** or discipline play in God's work of refining His people (vv. 25–27)? Have you experienced God using hardship to grow your faith?
- 10. Isaiah 1:17 calls God's people to "seek justice, correct oppression, bring justice to the fatherless, plead the widow's cause." What would it look like for our small group/church to live this out in practical ways today?
