Date: 11/9/25 **Text:** Isa 41-46

1. The Courtroom Scene:

In Isaiah 41:1–4, God summons the nations to "set forth their case." What does this courtroom imagery communicate about God's relationship to the nations and to false gods?

2. Predictive Power:

In Isaiah 41:21–23, God challenges idols to "tell us what is to come." Why is the ability to foretell the future such a key test of divinity?

3. Idolatry and Control:

What do people hope to gain from idols—whether ancient statues or modern substitutes (money, politics, reputation)? How do these things promise control, and how do they fail?

4. God's Sovereignty in History:

Isaiah repeatedly points to Cyrus (44:28–45:1) as proof that Yahweh directs history. How does fulfilled prophecy strengthen our confidence in God's sovereignty today?

5. The Futility of Idols:

Read Isaiah 44:9–20. What stands out to you in this satire of idol-making? What makes idolatry both irrational and yet deeply appealing?

6. God's Uniqueness:

In Isaiah 45:5–7, God declares, "I am the Lord, and there is no other." What aspects of God's character or actions in these chapters distinguish Him from all rivals?

7. Idols vs. Redeemer:

Contrast Isaiah 46:1–4 (idols that must be carried) with God's words, "I have made, and I will bear." What difference does it make that our God carries us instead of us carrying Him?

8. Heart-Level Idolatry:

Even if we don't bow to physical idols, what modern "idols of the heart" (Ezek. 14:3) compete for your trust or affection? How can Isaiah's message expose and heal that?
